




Farm Service Agency (FSA) has programs for the following:

- Assist new (less than 10 years) farmers & ranchers with operating, ownership, and/or down payment loans.
- Protect sensitive land providing payments for conservation through CRP, GRP, WRP, & CREP programs
- Provide income support to producers through a variety of commodity programs.
- Assist producers that cannot obtain commercial credit with operating and/or farm ownership loans.
- Provide funding & loans to restore land after a natural disaster.
- Offer interim financing allowing producers to hold over their crop without having to sell at harvest, often used with forward contracting
- Offer loans for construction of farm commodity storage facilities/structures.
- Provides youth (10-20 years old) loans for 4-H & FFA projects.

AG-ceptional

Early in the 2012 AG-ceptional conference, Nancy settled in to view a large-screened video and immediately recognized familiar surroundings....and herself. The Kirkholm farm, shop and interview with Nancy conducted two months earlier for a

"possible part in a women in agriculture documentary" was on display for the crowd. Called on stage to accept her AGceptional Woman of 2012 award, Nancy spotted her 85 year old parents, four of her six siblings, two of their spouses, and her son Tyler who she assumed was home minding the farm. Nancy had attended the conference with her daughter, Tess.

"Many Nebraska women deserve this recognition. My story is not unique in the farming community and farm wives in general possess ample qualities to handle this responsibility. However, I humbly admit that I have enjoyed the attention received as a result of the award! I think I am most proud that it was an agriculturally focused honor."

Nancy was raised near Anthon, Iowa, on the farm where her parents still reside. She is the middle of their five daughters and two sons. Following high school, she attended Iowa State University and graduated in 1979 with a degree in Agricultural Business. "I was one of the 2% of women in the College of Agriculture at Iowa State in those years. I had no warning of that when I chose my major. It just seemed the most logical direction for me even back then." Nancy's husband, Dennis, also attended Iowa State working toward an agricultural degree, as well. He was a member of FarmHouse Fraternity. Dennis and Nancy moved to Homer, NE in 1982 where they, along with Dennis's parents and brother continued to grow their operation on both the Iowa and Nebraska sides of the Missouri River. Dennis and Nancy's children, Tyler and Tess, were raised in Nebraska and graduated from the University of Nebraska with agricultural degrees. Dennis and Nancy stayed true to their Iowa State roots which proved challenging while raising two "Cornhusker" children.

The decision to continue farming following the loss of her husband was not made in haste. Nancy knew her husband's brother had planned to leave the family operation shortly before her husband's cancer diagnosis. He remained long enough to see the family through that current crop season. Nancy's son, Tyler, had received his Ag-Business degree from the University of Nebraska just five months prior, intending to return home to farm with his father. "Farming is an aging industry. We need to encourage young men and women who are willing to assume the risks and rewards of this profession. I had a dedicated and capable young son at my side who fit those qualifications." The exit of Nancy's brother-in-law and loss of her husband occurred in the same year. Planning for the next crop season alone with Tyler was conducted simultaneously with closing out the farm companies owned by her husband and brother-in-law. The Kirkholms' machinery sale was held eight months following Dennis' death. "A great number of primary aspects in my daily life had changed so quickly. Deciding to continue farming helped me regain control. Tyler and I had retained enough machinery to begin farming but watching the rest be sold off piece by piece was a difficult reality. For me, the sale was the second worst day of the year. To a grain farmer, machinery is more than a tangible asset."

Nancy understood early that challenges would arise from farming with a young son. "We lost a great deal of experience and problem-solving techniques when we lost Dennis. He always said he worked best under pressure which is a key trait as a farmer. Luckily for me, Tyler possesses many of his father's qualities." "We have been greatly tested but I believe in the oft-used cliché that it will only make us stronger. That and, of course, the strength gained from the heavens above."

"My daughter, Tess, is the positive, neutralizing force between Tyler and myself. We are always in business mode. Though dedicated to agriculture herself, Tess reminds us to enjoy life away from the farm."

Nancy has been an active member of St. Cornelius Church in Homer for thirty-one years. She served on the Homer school board from 2000-2008 and is currently a board member on the Educational Service Unit #1 in Wakefield, NE. Nancy was one of the original members of The Dakota County Economic Development committee and was one of the founding members on the board of Siouxland Ethanol in Jackson, NE.
