

Nebraska's farmers are growing more with less water and fewer chemicals thar ever before. And yet, we still struggle with the quality of our water in some areas.

Nitrate levels in Nebraska's groundwater are on the rise, especially in portions of Northeast Nebraska. The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) has analyzed the nitrate data gathered from their Groundwater Quality Sampling Program and have found some troubling trends across their 15-county district.

Data collected over the past 40 years indicates elevated concentrations of nitrate in portions of Cuming, Colfax, and Dodge Counties, reaching levels that could pose health risks to humans and threaten the environment.

The agriculture industry depends on clean water, healthy soil, and pure air to supply a growing world with food, feed, and fuel. Farmers meet daily challenges as they work to protect our resources for future generations.

Working together, we can make a positive impact on the health of our soils and the quality of our groundwater.

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

vice president of communications and marketing strategy. "Soy is a renewable ingredient and it feels like every day I come across another use or another research opportunity for a new use."

First it was replacing formaldehyde, now it's replacing road surfaces. Soy-based asphalt is being tested for viability through a joint research project being conducted by UNL's Industrial Agricultural Products Center, the Agricultural Utilization Research Institute of Minnesota and the USB.

"This project demonstrates the ability to utilize a soybean oil-based road preservation product, RePlay, to compare applications in Minnesota and Nebraska to extend the life of recently established asphalt roads," said Loren Isom, director of UNL's Industrial Agricultural Products Center.

On top of the pavement, soybeans are becoming more prevalent in the engines traversing roadways. High oleic soybean oil is becoming an attractive alternative to petroleum. In a USB-funded project with Biosynthetic Technologies, a new high oleic soy-based motor oil displayed impressive functionality and life in U.S. Department of Defense fleet demonstrations and earned USDA certification as a biobased product.

"Soy-based motor oil is another great opportunity to drive demand for U.S. soybeans and allow companies to give customers what they want at the same time," said Ron Pavelka, a USB grower-leader and soybean farmer from Glenvil, Nebraska. "These partnerships benefit soybean farmers and agriculture, as well as a variety of industries and end users."

Big-name companies are bringing soy-based products to market. After Goodyear used soy to develop an effective all-weather tire, Skechers is using the same technology to develop a new line of running shoes with plans to also create safety and work shoes in the future.

Solely because of the benefits of soy.

"The versatile chemical composition of soybeans is driving a surge of soy technology," Jansen said. "The potential for U.S. soy in industrial uses is limitless thanks to a high-quality product and the farmers who grow it sustainably."



it was declared a carcinogen in the U.S., manufacturers were left looking for a missing ingredient in several products.

Enter soybeans.

"Soybean flour has been able to seamlessly replace formaldehyde in a multitude of products, which continues to increase," said John Jansen, the United Soybean Board's (USB) vice president of strategic partnerships. "As the soybean industry, it's a win-win for us and the companies using U.S. soy. We have a fantastic product to bring to them."

"The miracle crop" keeps finding its way into manufacturing plants in dozens of industries. Through funding, research and partnerships, organizations like the USB and the University of Nebraska– Lincoln (UNL) are pushing soybeans into its next frontier: consumer products.

"There are more than 1,000 different soybased products available on the market today, including everything from turf grass to machinery lubricants to tires and asphalt," said Mace Thornton, the USB's

WOMAN OF THE YEAR 2020-LISA KRUGER

"It was a great honor to win this award and I hope I can inspire other young women to follow their dreams no matter where it takes them. Opportunities abound everywhere in the agriculture industry and with hard work and determination you can accomplish your goals in whatever field you pursue." Kruger said after winning the award.

Lisa M. Kruger, Columbus, the daughter of Gerald and Judy Kruger of Randolph, graduated from Pierce High School in 1985. She held various FFA offices during her four years and received the State Farmer Degree, was State Wildlife Speaking Champion, and second in State Horse Proficiency.

She attended Northeast Community College for two years and was on the livestock judging team. She received her Associate of Science in Livestock Production, and worked at the Norfolk sale barn.

Lisa transferred to Texas A&M University graduating in 1990 with a Bachelor of Science in Animal Science. She received a Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo Scholarship, and was a member of the TAMU livestock judging team that was the reserve national champion team.

Following graduation she was employed with IBP Inc. in Luverne, MN as scale house coordinator for cattle procurement and then to Lexington, NE for the plant startup as scale house coordinator. In 1992, as the first woman cattle buyer for IBP, she was put in the country as a cattle buyer in West Central lowa. She coached the 4-H livestock judging team, helped manage the Western IA Progress show, and came back and helped at Northeast with livestock judging team workouts. In1999 IBP sent her to Missouri to buy cattle covering ¾ of the state and four counties in Illinois. She did a lot of driving putting loads of cattle together, sometimes 4-5 owners on a truck.

In 2006, she left IBP/Tyson and went to work for Cargill as a cattle buyer in Mitchell, SD and was a member of the Chamber of Commerce Ag Committee. She covered the eastern third of the state and went up into ND. In 2010, she won the Cargill Cattle Procurement Bronc Davis Award. Bronc Davis was a Cargill cattle buyer who lost his battle with colon cancer. The trophy symbolizes all he stood for in the eyes of his peers: hard work, an aggressive nature, positive attitude, a never give up philosophy, being innovative as well as civic minded, and maintaining a desire to help fellow employees. She was the first female to receive this award.

In 2012, they moved her to Columbus, NE as the plant cattle buyer with duties including buying cattle and as the cattle buyer representative at the plant in Schuyler, representing 10-12 cattle buyers that send cattle to that plant. Cargill has beef customers and Cargill employees that visit the plant that have never been to a feed yard. One of Lisa's duties is to line up feed yard tours to explain the fed cattle industry and where the beef they are serving or selling comes from and the pride taken by cattle feeders in raising a healthy, safe product. Tour groups included Cargill employees, restaurant chefs and owners, Japanese and South Korean beef salesmen and Cargill beef salesmen from both coasts.

She has helped her nephew's livestock judging team with a workout and has continued to return home to the family farm east of Pierce, to help during harvest and working feeder cattle. She says that is her way to relax and get away from the cell phone. She has two horses at the farm. Her other hobbies include tennis, golf, and bowling. She does a little photography work, senior pictures, wedding and family pictures, as well as loving wildlife photography. She also likes traveling the country with her friends.

She has one sister, Michelle Meier and her husband, John, retired Air Force pilot of 22 years, and nieces, Katrina, a junior at UNO majoring in engineering and Abigail, a freshman at UNO majoring in biomechanics/pre-med, and a nephew, Alexander, a junior at Pierce High School.
