The Northeast Community College Board of Governors met for its regular session Board Meeting on Thursday, September 14, 2023 in Suite 197 of the Lifelong Learning Center, located on the campus of Northeast Community College, 801 East Benjamin Avenue, Norfolk, NE.

1. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

4. BOARD EDUCATION AND INFORMATION

- 4.1 Administrative Services Report
 - 4.1.1 <u>Monthly Financial Report and Paid Bills</u>

Review was given to the financial report for the period ending August 31, 2023 and detail was provided on the items of significance within the paid bills report.

4.1.2 Budget planning/discussion 2023-2024

Review was given to five-year budget revenue and expenditure projection scenarios and preliminary discussion was held regarding the proposed 2023-2024 general fund and capital fund budgets. Some of the anticipated budget increases are a result of growth in enrollment, market-based compensation and benefits for employees and technology improvements.

Factors that were part of the discussion include:

- Northeast Community College has a history of being good stewards of its resources and continues to do so.
- Northeast's role and mission is to serve its 20-county service area.
- Northeast has lowered its levy the past two years and requested fewer dollars in its property tax asking in three of the past four years.
- Northeast has not requested more property tax dollars than the previous year since the 2018-2019 fiscal year. Even with an increase in tax asking for the 2023-2024 fiscal year, Northeast's property tax asking will only average 2.14% annually over the past five years.
- In each of the prior three years, the total property tax asking decreased from the prior year. This equates to a 1.39% total increase over the last four years, which is significantly less than the rate of inflation.
- The college's portion of a taxpayer's total property tax varies in each county of the 20-county service area, but generally only represents about 5% of the overall property tax bill.
- Northeast is currently using reserve dollars to meet its budget.

• Due to recent legislation, beginning with the 2023 income tax filing year and in successive years, 100% of the property tax paid to support community colleges can be rebated as part of an individual or family's income tax filing.

Northeast Community College will participate in the Madison County Joint Public Hearing on September 21st. Entities in Madison County, Nebraska that exceeded last year's property tax request by 2%, plus the percentage of real valuation growth, are included in the Joint Public Hearing and listed on the 'pink postcard' that is mailed to constituents.

Because the board wants to be responsive to taxpayer perspectives, a meeting will be held on September 26^{th} to set the 2023-2024 budget and property tax levy.

4.1.3 2024-2025 tuition, fees, housing, and meal plans

Historically, review is given to how Northeast compares to other colleges, along with cost of attendance, and financial needs. Preliminary review was given to peer and regional institutional comparative data regarding tuition, fees, housing and mail plan rates. Meeting the needs of our students and access to education are also factors that are considered.

Additional information may be received over the next several weeks and will be brought forth to the October meeting to allow for additional discussion prior to approval of rates for 2024-2025.

4.2 Development/External Relations Report

- 4.2.1 President's update
 - Hosted on campus, Joann Li, UNO Chancellor, along with some of her administrative staff. A visit to UNO is scheduled for November. Looking forward to enhancing our relationship with UNO.
 - Recent industry visits include CIE, CF Industries, and Elkhorn Rural Public Power District.
 - Nebraska Statewide Workforce and Educational Reporting System (NSWERS) is a state-of-the-art data system that promotes a strong economy, good jobs, growing business, and thriving communities. NSWERS is the only resource in the state that integrates education data from preschool to grade 12, through college, and into work, creating a holistic view of the learning and earning journey. NSWERS receives its philanthropic funding from the Omaha region. NSWERS partners include the Nebraska Department of Education, all six Nebraska community colleges, the Nebraska State College System, and the University of Nebraska System. The Nebraska Department of Labor provides the connection from education to employment.
 - Community college presidents will meet in Grand Island on October 1st and will then meet with board members on October 2nd to discuss reactions from the Joint Public Hearing and what the future strategy for NCCA will be.

- A group of seven businesses in the greater Norfolk area are working on a creative solution to support increasing the quality of childcare in the greater Norfolk area as well as meet the demands of 700+ children in the greater Norfolk area who do not have childcare. This is a long-term project that could change the landscape of childcare.
- Multiple meetings with Senator Dover have had fruitful discussions about manufacturing in his district. He has spent time with manufacturers in the area to find ways to create employee pipelines in the region.
- Nebraska Math Readiness Project increased its participants from 19 in Fall 2022 to 150 in Fall 2023.
- Due to conflicts with already scheduled conferences, discussion was held on board meeting date changes for 2024 and will be reflected on upcoming agendas.
- Northeast's 50th anniversary celebration will be held on Saturday, September 16th, from 10:30 a.m.-3:00 p.m.

4.3 Student Services Report

4.3.1 Enrollment Report

Northeast's Tenth Day Enrollment Report for fall 2023 reveals 4,781 students enrolled on the 10th day of Fall 2023. An estimated additional 590 students are yet to be enrolled in the college's job training and safety courses due to a processing change. Taking the 590 estimated students into consideration, Northeast is estimated to be up 2% (127 students) in headcount and .42% (190) in credit hours.

Fall 2023 Tenth Day Enrollment for Early College Students reveals 1,972 enrolled Early College students, up 199 students (11%) compared to Fall 2022.

6. COMMITTEE REPORTS

6.1 Governance Committee

The Governance Committee met on August 30th. Content review was conducted of EL-04, <u>Planning</u>, and there were no recommended revisions. Discussion was held regarding the succession plan in case of a sudden loss of the president. Dr. Barrett reported that in interim plan is in place to continue the duties of the position until the Board of Governors has selected a new president.

Standing committees of the college reconvened in the fall and continue to work to assure that new policies cover all content from old policies. These policies will be presented to the Board of Governors in the coming months.

7. MONITORING REPORT

7.1 EL-08, Communication and Support to the Board

Members of the Board of Governors were surveyed to provide evidence of compliance. Nine of the eleven members of the board completed the survey, and the results suggest compliance of the policy.

The President provides updates to the board as part of the monthly board meeting These include progress on strategic priorities, governmental relations, college culture, student engagement, enrollment and eternal relations. Between board meetings, the President also provides updates, as appropriate, to ensure board members are well-informed as it relates to their roles and responsibilities and impending decisions. In addition, legislative updates received from the NCCA executive director are also forwarded to members of the Board of Governors. Furthermore, per direction of the president, the board recording secretary also aides in providing information, materials, and update to members of the board.

EL-08 was accepted as presented as the board agrees that compliance is met regarding communication and support to the board.
